### **Considering Data Literacy Using Kuhlthau's Information Search Process: Implications for Librarians and Data Providers August 16, 2:00 pm**

This panel discusses uses of Kuhlthau's Information Search Process (ISP) to illustrate ways that librarians can assist students and collaborate with data providers to improve the data search process. Librarians and data providers share similar data literacy goals, and this panel pools the expertise of both groups to focus on strategies and interventions that support novice researchers. We explore our combined experiences and jointly step through students' research phases to examine how each group can contribute to improving that experience. Moreover, we explore ways to review students' data literacy needs throughout the research process through the lens of Kuhlthau's six-stage, iterative ISP. Kuhlthau's framework, rooted in empathy, maps to existing knowledge about what students do, think, and feel at various stages of the search process. Register here:

### **Why DEI Training is Not Working**

**August 25, 2:00 pm - 3:00 pm**

According to a McKinsey Report, organizations large and small spend an average of \$8 billion dollars a year on diversity training. Nearly two-thirds of colleges and universities offer diversity trainings for faculty, staff, and students each year for an annual estimate of over \$280 million. Yet, hundreds of studies dating back to the 1930s suggest that anti-bias and diversity training

does not reduce bias, alter behavior, or change the cultural climate of the organization. Although diversity training does not work, it does not mean the problem cannot be solved. Libraries can go from popular “drive by” diversity training sessions to creating change that supports an inclusive workplace culture for everyone. 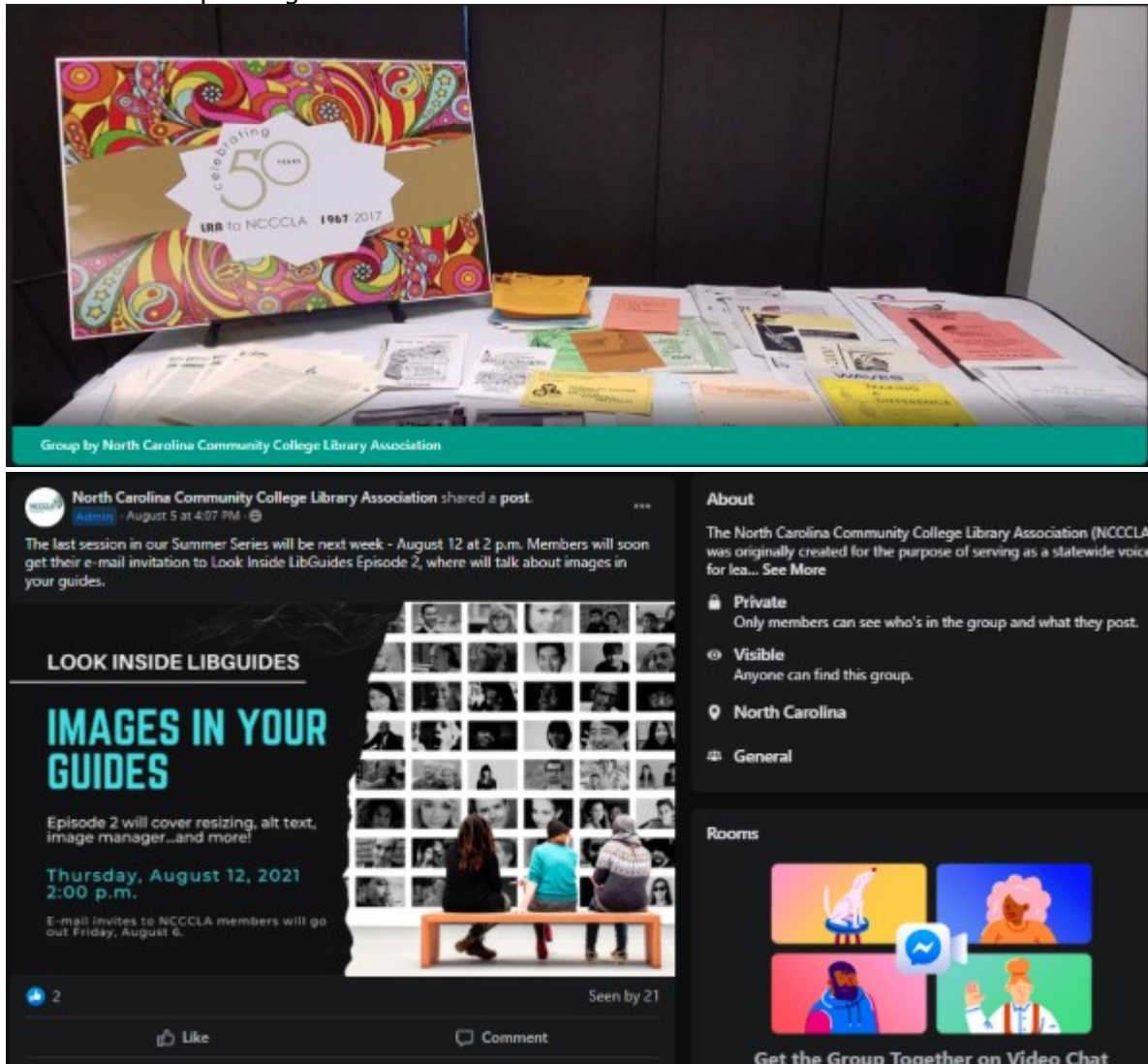
